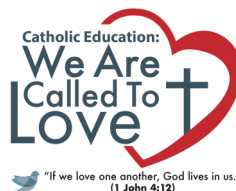
### Lunch Monitor's Needed

## Lunch Policy

### DID YOU KNOW?

Children are encouraged to stay at school for both nutrition breaks or stay for the first nutrition break. The majority of students stay. Please let your child's teacher know if your child will always be going home for second nutrition break, otherwise it is assumed your child will be staying at school. "Going out for lunch" is not permitted due to safety and logistical reasons. Rather two hot lunch days per week are provided by the school which can be ordered and paid for online.

## Lunch Orders and Cashless School

Hot lunch will start at the end of the month and is available on Tuesday and Thursday's. Please remember that all hot lunch orders (pizza, subs, pasta) and field trip payments will only be available for purchase using our **School Cash Online ordering & payment system**. This will allow for easier ordering and maintenance of due dates. It is the school board's preference to have all cash transactions made using School Cash Online. Also, **hot lunch order forms will only be posted on the website**. There will be no paper copies sent home. Please make sure you have subscribed to the school's website in order to receive the email alerts when hot lunch order forms are posted so you don't miss out!



## Back to School Footwear

Each student should bring a pair of indoor and a pair of outdoor shoes to school in September. It is important to have a pair of non-marking indoor runners for gym use only. Please remember that flip flops and Crocs are not good footwear for school because they either slip on floors and get caught under doors providing little protection for children's toes. Running shoes are the best option. If your child cannot tie their shoelaces it is highly encouraged to purchase Velcro or no-tie running shoes.

All classes have a corresponding virtual Brightspace environment. Your virtual classroom will be the place where teachers post information about classroom events, topics being covered, homework, etc. (information that can be viewed by all students and families). Most grades/marks for tests and assignments can also be viewed on Brightspace so you are able to monitor your child's progress. If you are unsure of how to access this platform, please reach out to your child(ren)'s teachers. If the message is specific to just your child or family, the teacher will connect with you via the email address that we have on file at the school or by phone.

## Student Punctuality/Attendance

We encourage parents to model the importance of punctuality and regular attendance for children which is important for student success. There is a direct correlation between children who are often late or absent and lowered academic achievement. All teachers begin the day with either Language or Math which are very important to a student's success. We all want our children to do well in school and life, and punctuality and attendance is very important. Students who arrive after 8:45 am must go to the office for an admit slip prior to proceeding to class.

If you wish to withdraw your child during the course of a day, please call the office, buzz the office outside to make your request or send an e-mail to the classroom teacher.

## Progressive Discipline

Progressive Discipline is a whole-school approach that utilizes a continuum of interventions, supports, and consequences to address inappropriate student behavior and to build upon strategies that promote positive behaviours. In everything that we do in the Brant Haldimand Norfolk Catholic District School Board and Resurrection School, we are led by our Faith and a conscious effort to model the Beatitudes while responding as a caring Catholic community. It includes a response to misbehavior which shifts the focus from punitive to corrective and supportive. It also includes a range of responses that include learning opportunities for reinforcing positive behavior while helping students make good choices in the future. Restorative questions utilized in the event someone has harmed include:

- What happened?
- What were you thinking of at the time?
- What have you thought about since?
- Who has been affected by what you have done? In what way?
- What do you think you need to do to make things right?



For pupils with special education and/or disability related needs, interventions, supports and consequences will be consistent with the expectations in the students' individual education plan (IEP) and/or his/her demonstrated abilities. The principal/vice-principal will also take into consideration all mitigating factors as required by the Education Act.

In some circumstances, positive practices and progressive discipline might not be effective or sufficient in addressing inappropriate student behavior. In such circumstances, the Board supports the use of progressive discipline consequences up to and including suspension, or expulsion from all schools of the Board. (More detail can be found within the Brant Haldimand Norfolk Catholic District School Board: Student Behaviour, Discipline & Safety Policy 200.09).

### **Range of Responses:**

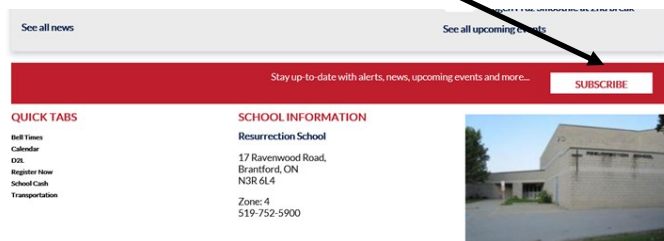
- Verbal/non-verbal messages from teacher or adult in authority
- Re-location within the classroom or learning environment
- Private conversations with student, to help student to reflect, to develop alternative behaviours
- Collaboration with parent or guardian
- Peer mediation
- Restorative practices or community services
- Suspension (principal/vice-principal shall consider mitigating circumstances as per Board Policy 200.9)
- Expulsion (principal/vice-principal shall consider mitigating circumstances as per Board Policy 200.9)

## Parking on Ravenwood Road



In order to ensure the safety of our children, parents/guardians are asked to **please obey traffic signs and to park on the street only where permitted.**

Please do not park in no parking zones. Parking in these zones causes visibility issues for students crossing the street.

Please ensure that you do not block the driveways of our neighbours as we have received some complaints in this regard in the past.

**The parking lot is reserved for staff only.**

## Outdoor Supervision

A teacher supervisor is on the playground from 8:30—8:45 a.m. in the morning. The students are encouraged to arrive during that time.

Parents walking students attending our KG Program are asked to drop them off at the fenced area adjacent to their classroom where they will be greeted by a staff member.

**Students should not enter or exit the school using the front door. All students will enter/exit through the playground doors.**





## **Hand Hygiene for School**

Removing bacteria and viruses from our hands is an important way to prevent the spread of illness. The spread of germs that cause the flu (influenza virus), the common cold (rhinovirus) and diarrhea and vomiting (norovirus) can all be reduced with good hand hygiene.

Reducing the spread of illness in schools helps to keep children in class so they can continue to learn.

Hand hygiene is important:

- ◇ After using the washroom.
- ◇ After coughing or sneezing.
- ◇ Before eating snacks or lunch.
- ◇ After touching animals.
- ◇ When hands look dirty—especially after recess or gym.



Hand hygiene refers to removing germs—bacteria and viruses from our hands. These germs can make us sick when we touch our mouth, eyes, nose or an open sore.

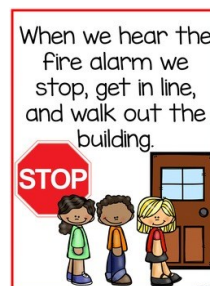
Hand hygiene can be done by either:

- ◇ Hand washing with soap and water or
- ◇ Using a hand sanitizer

We will continue to review the importance of hand washing throughout the year to help prevent the spread of viruses.

## **Fire Drills and Lockdown Drills**

We are fortunate in Canada that intruder violence or fires in schools rarely occur. However, we cannot be complacent with respect to our preparedness for such an event. As such, our staff has reviewed lockdown and fire drills and plan to conduct a lockdown drill and 3 fire drills in the next few weeks and will do the same again in the spring. Teachers will talk to the children before the drills to prepare them. Talking about the drills at home with your child can also alleviate any anxiety. Remind children to follow teacher/police/principal direction, not to use cell phones, and to remain silent during a lockdown. Also, please note that during an emergency situation at the school, we ask that you do not phone the school or your child's cell phone since a ringing phone may alert an intruder to the student's whereabouts or it may tie up phone lines that are needed to communicate with emergency personnel. We will communicate to parents via web-site, twitter, letter or call out system as soon as possible. Please keep all of your contact information up to date in the office so that we can reach you in case of emergency.



## **Treats and Birthdays**

Please do not send in treats for the class on your child's birthday. Under the Ministry Policy (P/PM 150), and the BHNCD SB Nutrition Policy, the maximum number of days in the school year that may be designated as special treat days for a school is ten (10). Special treat days allow the schools to serve or sell foods or beverages that do not comply with the standards in P/PM 150 and the BHNCD SB Nutrition Policy. In a normal school year, Resurrection's special treat days include Fall Frenzy, Halloween, Turkey Luncheon, last day before Christmas break, Valentine's Day, Shrove Tuesday, Grade 8 Graduation and the last day of school. We reserve a couple of extra days for events that may come up. Thank you for your cooperation.



## **Before and After School Program**

The YMCA will once again be offering a before and after school program at our school. YMCA School Age Child Care gives parents peace of mind. The program is based out of the school the child attends, thereby providing them with a seamless day in one location. Every program is staffed by YMCA trained professionals, selected for their educational background and aptitude for working with children. The end result is a safe, nurturing environment to begin and end their day at school. The morning component allows children to ease into their day and the afternoon component strikes the perfect balance between structured activities and free play. ## Allergy Alert for Peanuts/Nuts

Due to student and staff allergies, Resurrection School is a nut safe school.

Students are asked to bring lunches and snacks free of peanuts and tree nuts as well as products that have the “may contain peanuts/tree nuts” warning on them. Please read labels before sending food to school. Keep in mind not all packaging is clearly labeled with the warning. Truly, this is a life saving measure. If you have caregivers who provide your child with lunches or snacks you will need to share this information with them.

### **READ THE LABELS!**

- That means there should be **NO** tree nuts & peanuts in the product.
- The item should also be made in a **TREE NUT & PEANUT FREE FACILITY**.
- The label can NOT say “May Contain Nuts” or made on equipment that also processes nuts, or anything similar.

\*\*\*Please note that the use of peanut butter substitutes (e.g., WOW butter etc.) is not permitted. The reasoning behind this is that the peanut butter substitutes look and smell like peanut butter, which makes it difficult for staff to monitor as well as possibly causing anxiety for students with severe peanut allergies.

### **FOR YOUR INFORMATION:**

- **Peanuts:** a member of the legume family and not related to tree nuts.
- **Tree Nuts:** Almonds, Brazil Nuts, Cashews, Chestnuts, Hazelnuts, Hickory Nuts, Macadamia Nuts, Pecans, Pine Nuts, Pistachios, Shea Nuts and Walnuts.



## Prevalent Student Medical Conditions

The safety and well-being of children in our care is of the utmost importance to the staff within our school. If your child has a prevalent medical condition that requires support or monitoring, we request that you contact the school as soon as possible to ensure that our staff have the necessary information to ensure your child is safe while at school.

The following are medical conditions that require a **Plan of Care** as determined by Brant Haldimand Norfolk Catholic District School Board policy and/or provincial legislation. The **Plan of Care** will be completed in collaboration with the school administrative team:

- **Asthma** – Please complete the Asthma Plan of Care
- **Anaphylactic Reactions** – Please complete the Anaphylaxis Plan of Care
- **Diabetes** – Please complete the Diabetes Plan of Care
- **Epilepsy** – Please complete the Epilepsy Plan of Care



If your child has any of the aforementioned conditions and you have not yet completed the required forms, please contact the school immediately to provide the necessary information and receive a copy of the required forms.

Please note: It is the responsibility of parents to notify schools of any medical concerns and to update the Plans of Care on an annual basis.

## Medication

The staff at Resurrection School must follow Board procedures for the administration of medication during school hours. Authorization to provide such service must be made in writing by the parent on the appropriate form (obtained at the school or can be found on the Board's website—[www.bhncdsb.ca](http://www.bhncdsb.ca) under policy No. 200.05). Only prescription drugs will be administered. Non-prescription drugs such as Tylenol and the like will not be administered to the students.



## Medic Alert's No Child Without Program is at our School



The **No Child Without** program offers a free Medic Alert membership and bracelet to students who attend school and are between the ages of 4 up to their 14th birthday. If your child has a medical condition, allergy or is required to take medication on a regular basis then you should consider a Medic Alert membership through this program. It is your child's voice in an emergency.

Medic Alert membership:

- Gives emergency first responders immediate access to your child's medical information on their Medic Alert bracelet or necklet.
- Enables first responders to quickly obtain up to date medical information by means of the child's Electronic Health Record through the **24 Hour Emergency Hotline**.
- Communicates with the parent or emergency contact upon activation of the Hotline.
- Allows free updates of the child's medical record as needed.



Medic Alert identification can alert school staff, friends, coaches and others about your child's medical condition should an emergency occur. For further information visit [www.nochildwithout.ca](http://www.nochildwithout.ca)

## Dress Code Reminder



Modesty and common sense are the main guidelines for the dress code that is in place. Schools rely upon the good judgment and support of parents/guardians in helping their children determine appropriate wear for school.

The BHNCD SB believes that proper dress for pupils and staff helps to create a positive and safe Catholic learning environment consistent with the mission and values of the Board. The responsibility for meeting the expectations of the Dress Code is primarily that of the parents/guardians of the students.

All students and staff attire must be in keeping with our Catholic teachings and beliefs, reflect principles of modesty, and shall not include the following:

- Short shorts/skirts, bare midriffs, halter tops, tank tops, etc.;
- Accessories such as spiked bracelets/necklaces or any externals not in keeping with the spirit of the dress code, as determined by the local school; and/or
- Language and/or representation on attire that indicates gang affiliation and/or depicts violence, profanity or discrimination of any kind whatsoever or that otherwise demeans an identifiable individual or group.

## School Council Elections/Meeting



New faces are always welcome on School Council! The School Council is an advisory board to the principal. It makes recommendations to the principal based on the general views of the school community concerning issues like faith development, the school calendar of events, and fundraising to name a few. Council members lead two fundraising activities per year. Meetings are at least 4 times per year at the school. Come out and learn about your school activities, share your talents, help in raising funds and meet other parents involved in the school community. Our first council meeting will be on **Wednesday, September 20th at 7:00 p.m, following Meet the Teacher**. ## Student Accident Insurance



Our School Board **does not** provide accident insurance coverage for student injuries that occur on school property or during school activities, including extra-curricular sports.

Each year, many families are left financially unprotected when their children are injured at school, while participating in non-school activities or at home. If a student is injured, parent(s)/guardian(s) are responsible for any costs not covered by the Ontario Health Insurance Plan (OHIP) or their employer's health care plan. Please check with your provider regarding your coverage.

Most accident-related expenses are not fully covered under OHIP and some expenses like ambulance fees, casts, crutches, physiotherapy and emergency dental care are usually not covered at all. This leaves you, the parent/guardian, financially responsible.

To help protect your family, it is recommended that you consider obtaining student accident insurance. As a convenience to you, the Board has arranged to offer student accident insurance through insuremykids®. Participation is voluntary, but highly recommended, and the costs are to be paid by the parent/guardian. The program is available for students up to age 26.

Coverage is provided for a wide range of accidental expenses, including:

- **Dental Expenses** - includes 10 years unlimited dental benefit coverage, future dental up to \$1,650 per tooth, and injury-related orthodontia coverage up to \$2,500 per accident.
- **Total and Permanent Disability** - up to \$350,000.
- **Loss of Limb/Loss of Sight, Hearing, or Speech.**
- **Accidental Death.**
- **Ambulance Fees.**
- **And much more.**

Insuremykids® Student Accident Insurance offers three plans with 24/7 coverage at affordable rates – their most affordable plan is \$17 per year and their most popular plan is the Platinum at \$33 per year, which provides out-of-province emergency medical coverage and travel benefits. All annual plans provide **13 months of coverage** from the date of purchase. Family rates are available for three or more children in the same family, even if attending different schools. # Volunteering in our schools

### New requirements for volunteers

There are many ways to contribute to your child's education and school community. Volunteering is a great way to stay connected. We value the contribution of all our volunteers and appreciate their time spent supporting our students, staff and Catholic education.

## Requirements

A Vulnerable Sector Police Check AND completion of an Accessibility for Ontarians with Disabilities ACT (A.O.D.A.) training module are requirements of the Brant Haldimand Norfolk Catholic District School Board for all volunteers.

### Vulnerable Sector Police Check (Criminal Background Check)

A form obtained at the school is taken to your local police station and a search, based on the information provided, is performed by police. Volunteers must have a Vulnerable Sector Police Check every three years. In years when the check is not required, the volunteer must sign the prescribed Offence Declaration. All volunteers (parents, guardians, grandparents, etc.) require a Vulnerable Sector Police Check. If you do not have one on file at the school at the time of the event (e.g., class trip), you will not be permitted to participate. Such events/activities include, but are not limited to: class trips, field trips, excursions, classroom volunteers and volunteer drivers, coaches, various reading or other unsupervised curriculum program assistance.

### Accessibility for Ontarians with Disabilities Act (A.O.D.A.) Training **NEW!**

All volunteers are required to complete an online A.O.D.A. training module prior to performing volunteer duties. Once a volunteer completes the online training, a certificate acknowledging completion can either be printed and taken to the school(s), or can be emailed to the school(s).

#### Q. How do I access the online training?

A. Visit your school website and select **Volunteer** on the **School Information** menu.



#### Q. What if I don't have a computer or require accommodation to take the training?

A. The online training can be accessed from any computer with an internet connection. If you do not have a computer at home, you can use a public computer (such as your local public library) or come to the school and we will provide one for your use.

#### Q. What if I require accommodation to take the training or need other assistance?

A. If you require any assistance, please contact the school. We will arrange a solution that meets your needs.

Please note that individual Police Detachments determine their own Vulnerable Sector Police Check procedure. We work closely with all detachments to improve communication and to assist with streamlining the process for our valued volunteers.
